## Vocabulary:

<u>Cob-</u> the central part of an ear of corn, generally yellow <u>Cultivation-</u> to grow, tend and raise crops <u>Harvest-</u> gathering a crop that is ripe <u>Kernel-</u> seed part of an ear of corn <u>Lye-</u>strong solution used to make soap <u>Plow-</u> farm tool used to break up soil <u>Preservation-</u> to protect food from spoiling and prepare for future use <u>Stalk-</u>the stem part of the corn plant Threshing-to separate the seeds from the stalk and husks
